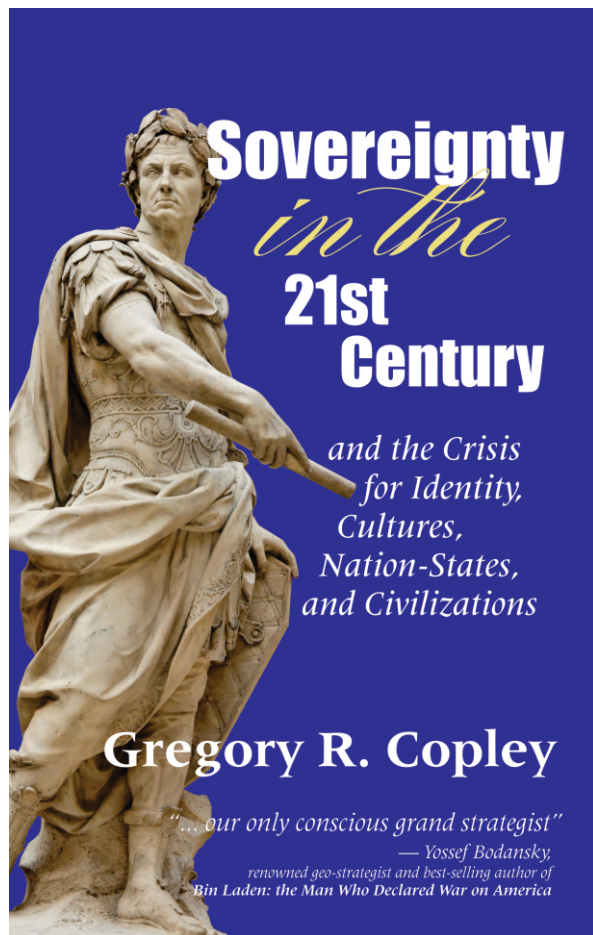


**Special ACM Book Launch Invitation: October 3, 2018**

**The Book:** The author explains why so many societies today are returning to the safety of traditional governance mechanisms. For the first time, we see the real differences and similarities between republicanism and constitutional monarchies explained. But is the reviving threat to Australian identity one merely of republicanism, or is it a “republicanism” as a disguise for urban utopian globalism? We are in a world already at war with itself. It is a world in which urban globalists fear and despise regional nationalists, and *vice-versa*. It is a time when the concept of the nation-state — sovereignty incarnate — has slipped from the minds of many. The populations of the mega-cities have — as they have in different ways in the past — assumed that they alone represented “the state”. The response to this has been a voter revolt in many areas of the world and the sudden reappearance of the schisms between cities and regions. “Nationalism” has become, for many in the cities, a pejorative term, but an expression of hope for revival of many in the regions. But what do we know of the issues which are really at stake in this changing century? Can we adequately describe the meaning of sovereignty — of individuals as well as states — or the fundamental differences between republics and constitutional monarchies; between empires and suzerainties? Yet all these issues will determine whether we will live in calm and prosperity, or chaos and fear.



**The Author:** This is the 35<sup>th</sup> book by Australian author Gregory Copley (pictured), President of The International Strategic Studies Association (ISSA), and its Zahedi Center for the Study of Monarchy, Traditional Governance, and Sovereignty, based in the Washington, DC, area. He is Editor-in-Chief of *Defense & Foreign Affairs* publications. Copley has advised leaders around the world for more than four decades, and has been recognized internationally, including being created a Member of the Order of Australia in 2007.
